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Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Planning your funeral, memorial service, or celebration of life should not be looked upon as a morbid task which one should avoid. It should be looked upon as a joyful celebration of your life and a way to help your family and friends transition to a life without you.

A funeral is an Easter celebration. This Easter celebration should be a time of joy. We are reminded in scripture that, “neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God...”

This letter and the accompanying planning guide are meant to serve you as you and your family begin the planning process. The best services are the result of the collaboration of the funeral home, the minister, and the family working together to create a celebration which will commend the person to God and give hope to those who mourn.

It is important that the minister be informed whenever there is serious illness or death. The minister may wish to be present with you and your family whenever possible throughout the illness, the dying process and grieving the death.

A funeral or memorial service is helpful for mourners to recognize the reality of their loss and allows them to transition to life without you.

A custom for many is to send flowers to memorialize you and to show support to the family. There are other options though. In lieu of flowers, memorial offerings may be designated for a favorite charity or organization.

This service is often performed by a minister/priest. Some like to have family members or close friends speak. Sometimes unscripted thoughts or words can drift the service into a whole different service than what you may have wanted.

Taking time to reflect on a speaker and providing them a time frame will make sure the service doesn't disappoint your expectations. Please also remember that if you choose a speaker, they may go beyond your expected time frame for the service. I have been doing this for many years and a speaker's comments usually will double in time. Plan for a lengthy speech.

Some don't want a super religious service. Some want a true celebration. Please make sure your wishes are expressed to the minister. This is your family's time of transition and will help them through this grieving process.

Whatever the individual choices, the intention is always to treat the body and the memory of the departed person with all the respect and love due a child of God. Please keep this completed packet in a place that will be easy for the family to find. I would also suggest that you make your family aware of this packet and location. If you wish to provide your minister with a copy, please do. If that is a choice, remember that all ministers will keep this in confidence and will not share until the appropriate time.

Do you have a letter of wishes?

A ‘letter of wishes’ contains information that you would like your family to carry out. This could include funeral details, songs, speakers, and the pastor you wish to preside at your service.

This letter could also express other details that you would like that a will or last testament does not contain.

Family Liaison/Spokesperson:

When planning a funeral for yourself or a loved one, it is advised that you sit down with your loved ones to discuss the plans. When family members are included in the discussion, there is a clearer sense of understanding of what will happen, what is going to happen and how the funeral or memorial service will be conducted.

Selecting someone to be the liaison or spokesperson will provide clarity when speaking with the funeral director, the church, and your minister. It will also help coordinate plans with police agencies and honor guards.

Who would you like to be your spokesperson:

Relationship (*the funeral director will want to know*)

Do you want a service?

Many choose not to have a service. This may be your wish. Please know that the service is not for you, it is for family and friends to transition to life without you.

There are other options available that are not a traditional funeral service.

You can have a reception (allowing people to come and go). This gathering can be at your home and people can come and go during a certain time frame.

You can rent a space (some funeral homes have a wine bar or gathering place that you can rent to share memories).

You can have a picnic (weather permitting) at a park.

Don't limit your ideas. The FOP Chaplain has designed services that meet the wishes of the family and the deceased.

Please discuss this with your family. They may want to have a service or gathering to help them.

Which Funeral Service do you want to use?

Has your family utilized a specific funeral home?

A funeral home is regulated by the Federal Trade Commission and the State of Oklahoma (<https://oklahoma.gov/funeral.html>).

This is a service. They offer a variety of services at a cost to you. Please be mindful of the choices you make. They have a variety of packages to offer (casket, urn, pamphlets, slideshow, music etc.).

I would like to use:

(Funeral Home)

Do you want a traditional burial?

The average funeral cost for a burial is about \$7,400.00. Basic funeral services can start at \$5,500.00. The cost can climb upwards of \$30,000 or more.

Do you have cemetery plots now? If not, you will need to purchase a cemetery plot. Cost for these plots can vary depending on which cemetery you choose. You will also need to plan to have opening and closing costs.

If you have chosen a burial option, you also will need to have a vault that your casket will be placed within.

You can call any funeral home and ask for their price list (what their basic cost is and they must tell you over the phone). They can email you their price list.

You can call any cemetery and ask for their price list (plot, basic cost for opening and closing).

If you want to discuss this with the FOP Chaplain, please feel free to contact the Chaplain.

You may want to consult your minister if you are a member of a church. They can also guide you.

Do you want to a cremation service?

The average cremation costs \$6,400.00. The basic cremation can begin at \$1,000.00.

If you choose cremation, you don't always need an urn. If you want to have your ashes at home, an urn may be appropriate for display. There are many options that are available and they all have their individual costs.

Faith Traditions and Funeral Practices

Each faith tradition has their own rituals. Please consult your minister about those traditions.

If you are not a member of the church, the FOP Chaplain will be glad to guide you or your family during this time. If you would like the FOP Chaplain to officiate your service, please let him know.

Every faith tradition has something to offer those who are believers, doubters, and disbelievers.

You must remember that this is a way to help your family through a **life transition**.

They are going to need this transition time. Life without you will be the hardest moment in their lives and helping them transition is the reason for any type of celebration.

No matter what, this service, or any type of celebration, should be characterized with joy in mind.

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend Lazarus. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

Those of other faith traditions or non-believers also experience grief. Just because there is a different tradition, or someone who doesn't believe, shouldn't mean that we should skip a celebration of life. Remember this is helping your loved ones transition to life without you.

Types of Services:

There are three types of services for the departed:

1) A **funeral** is the liturgy for the Burial of the Dead with the body present, either in a casket, or as ashes in an urn. It is usually held within a few days of the person's death. It can be held in a church, at a graveside, or a funeral home.

A funeral liturgy can also be in the absence of a body or ashes, such as when the body is willed to science, or when there are no remains. This is to be distinguished from a memorial service (see #3).

2) A committal or graveside service is a brief liturgy that usually follows the funeral directly at the place where the body or ashes are to be interred. It can also be a stand-alone event.

3) A memorial service is a liturgy without either the body or ashes. It can be held at a stated time from a few days up to a year after the death, such as an anniversary, or held in a place other than where the funeral was held.

About the Funeral Liturgy:

A funeral service helps the family to transition to a life without their loved one. It is a time to cry, to laugh, and to remember the life of their loved one.

The order of service is usually prepared by the pastor or officiant.

The pastor will organize the service based on several factors.

- Songs you may want played
- A slide show (video) you want to show
- Those you have asked to speak
- Police honors
- Military honors
- Masonic rituals

If you are a member of a particular denomination, the minister (or pastor) may have certain requirements, rites, or rituals that will need to be followed based on their denominational guidelines. Please consult your minister.

Flowers:

Many people will send flowers to the family to express their condolences and to remember your loved one. You must be prepared to receive flowers before the funeral. Many send flowers to the funeral home. There are options that you can take the plants and flowers to your home or leave them at the gravesite (*please make your funeral director aware of your wishes*).

Many choose to ask for donations in lieu of flowers. These donations can be sent to many causes or programs that you or your family desire to support. The funeral home will help you publish that information.

Just remember, even if you designate a charity, people may still send plants or flowers. So be prepared to receive them. Also think about what you would like to do with them (*plants and flowers can be overwhelming*).

Organizational Rites:

Fraternal or other organizational rites are often added to, or mingled within, the service. If you wish to have one of these fraternal rites, please consult your minister to see when they are appropriate to have within your denomination guidelines.

Things to Consider

Vigil:

The vigil is also called a Wake, Visitation, Calling Hours, or Viewing.

It is common practice to have the body in a convenient place for friends and family to gather, usually on the night before the funeral. In our tradition (though not in popular culture), a vigil is often in the funeral home. It can occur in the home if one wishes.

The church's practice of the vigil is not a time of socializing but a time to lift the deceased up in prayer.

If you choose a vigil at the church, it is a good idea to have a room set aside for socializing and visiting with the family outside of the sanctuary. It is appropriate to have some form of brief liturgy during the vigil.

If the vigil is to take place at the church, some denominations have requirements, please consult your minister (*the requirements may call for a closed casket*).

If family members wish to have a viewing of the body, the funeral home would be an appropriate place to do this because many church traditions do not allow this.

A wake is traditionally held before the service. In recent times a wake has occurred after the funeral/burial. Many choose to have a wake after the service which allows for people to tell stories, hold a special toast (*with the deceased's favorite beverage*), or to host a meal for family and or friends.

The Location of the Service:

The Church strongly encourages church funerals – it is our home, not a strange place. It is where we most properly acknowledge our life in Christ.

If the family does not have a home church, the FOP Chaplain can help to locate a church campus that will allow the funeral (*honorariums apply for the church & staff members assisting*).

The funeral home chapel can be an alternate place when one does not have a home church.

Some choose to have a graveside service only. One consideration is that as we age, it is hard for some to hear at the graveside service. One should consider the weather and time of the year for a graveside service.

There are some who would prefer that their celebration of life not be conducted at a church or funeral home. They would like to have another venue for their celebration.

Things you need to consider with other venues. Do they have an adequate sound system for people to speak or tell stories? Do they have adequate parking? Do they have adequate seating?

Disposition of the body: Where will be the final resting place?

Will burial take place immediately following the service? Prior to?

Open vs. Closed Casket

Some traditions allow for an open casket before the service, during the service and after the service.

Having an open casket during the service can be distracting for some and difficult for others. You should really consider the implications of an open casket during the service.

Some like the casket to be opened at the end of the service so those in attendance can ‘pay their respects’.

Some like to have the casket open after everyone has left the room so that they may share family time to say goodbye.

No matter your preference, please make a sure your family is aware of your wishes.

Some church guidelines require that the casket be closed before it is brought into the church. Why? Because our theology teaches us that the body is a shell, that the person has already left it, and that we are both grieving the person who has lived, and celebrating the person’s soul which lives in peace and joy.

In the case of cremation, will the cremation take place before or after the funeral?

Some choose to have the body present for the funeral so they can have an open casket for people to view their loved one or friend. Some like the body present, even though they don’t open the casket.

Some like having the body present so the family can have some private viewing time after the service. In this case, the casket remains closed until only family is present.

There are lots of options to consider.

Burial Fees

Burial fees are not always included by the funeral home. The cost are associated with the cemetery. These fees vary based on casket burial or cremains burial.

Cemeteries have opening and closing cost that you need to consider.

Other costs:

Headstone or marker for the grave
Funeral pamphlets
Other services offered by the funeral home.

Do you have someone who you would like to speak?

Some like to invite close friends or family members to speak. Sometimes people want a specific person to read the obituary or read a scripture for the service.

(Please be mindful, the more people that are asked to speak can greatly lengthen the service)

What scriptures would you like to read?

There are some faith traditions that have suggested readings. Others faith traditions allow the minister to choose the scriptures or the family or decedent may have a favorite scripture.

(At the burial of a child, the passages from Lamentations, 1 John, and John 6, together with Psalm 23, are recommended).

From the Old Testament

Isaiah 25:6-9 (He will swallow up death for ever)

Isaiah 61:1-3 (To comfort those who mourn)

Lamentations 3:22-26,31-33 (The Lord is good to those who wait for him)

Wisdom 3:1-5,9 (The souls of the righteous are in the hands of God)

Job 19:21-27a (I know that my Redeemer lives)

From the Psalms:

23, 27, 42:1-7, 46, 90:1-12, 106:1-5, 116, 121, 130, 139:1-11.

From the New Testament

Romans 8:14-19,34-35,37-39 (The glory that shall be revealed)

1 Corinthians 15:2-26,35-38,42-44,53-58 (The imperishable body)

2 Corinthians 4:16--5:9 (Things that are unseen are eternal)

1 John 3:1-2 (We shall be like him)

Revelation 7:9-17 (God will wipe away every tear)

Revelation 21:2-7 (Behold, I make all things new)

The Gospel

Will there be other readings?

Is there a favorite poem or other non-scriptural reading that is a favorite that one would like to be read at the service? If there is something that was particularly loved by the deceased, it might be good to have someone read it (or a portion of it).

Who will read the lessons?

For each family, this is different. Some can't imagine trying to get up in front of the crowd. They merely wish to sit quietly. Members of the community or congregation are always available as readers in lieu of family. For some, however, reading at the service is a healing thing to do.

Will there be music?

Will there be singers or additional instruments?

There is no fee for the pre-recorded music. If pre-recorded music is to be used arrangements must be made to make sure that music can be played. Be mindful of copyright laws & music especially if the service is going to be live streamed.

Please also note that not all funeral homes have the ability to play music due to copyright infringements. The funeral Home will be able to advise you about what they can and can not do.

Funeral Music

Songs:

The Following Songs are just suggestions. People have a hard time thinking of the songs they would like to have played at their service. Any song can be appropriate for a service based on the personality of the person we are trying to honor. Remember, it is a joyful occasion.

Eulogy/Speakers

There is a time for someone to tell a life story about the deceased.

Please consider this option. If you have someone in mind, my strongest suggestion is that they have their thoughts written down so they don't go off and ramble.

In some traditions, eulogies are discouraged because of how we understand the purpose of the funeral. The funeral is the place to lift the deceased up to God and to cast our cares at God's feet. In short, the funeral is all about where God is in the midst of death and mourning.

If eulogies are prohibited, please consider making time and space available for friends to share their experiences of the deceased, since this is a healthy and healing activity. A luncheon or reception following the funeral is well suited for this.

Reception, Lunch or Dinner

There are many options for having lunch or dinner after the service. Some have it at the funeral home family center. Some choose to go to a restaurant. Some choose to have people come to their home.

This is an opportunity for family and friends to socialize and share stories.

If you choose to have a lunch gathering after the funeral, you must realize that some will have to return to work or begin traveling home.

If you want to consider including all the family, consider having a luncheon before the service.

Make sure to invite those you wish to attend.

Memorial Pamphlet or Service Bulletin:

Many churches will provide a church bulletin according to their tradition (if the service is at a church).

The church bulletin is different than the ‘memorial pamphlets’ that are sold by the funeral home. The funeral home charges for these based on the number requested. They often contain the obituary, service details and some photos.

Videos:

Funeral homes offer the family a tribute video (slide show). These are done at a cost.

Some faith traditions don’t allow for these slide shows during the service.

If you want to show a slide show during the funeral at a church, make sure the format is compatible with the church’s equipment.
